To identify key issues for human-sloth bear conflict			Yes	The main problems which primarily responsible towards the human-sloth bear conflict in Nilgiri have been identified and documented.
To quantify the nature and intensity of conflict			Yes	Information on human causality and mauling by sloth bears were collected from the forest department, Nilgiri hospital records and also from interactions with the villagers.
To study the local people's attitude towards the sloth bear conservation			Yes	We surveyed 18 villages and interacted personally with the local people and also conducted group meetings to know the people perception towards the conservation and protection of sloth bears.
To organise conflict awareness and conservation educational programmes		Yes		We conducted one painting workshop for local schools, two training sessions for forest field staffs, two sloth bear rescue operations and several village meetings for increasing awareness and conservation prospects.
To develop strategies and a conflict conservation plan for minimising the conflict			Yes	Prevention and mitigation strategy has been suggested with a proposed conflict conservation plan to the respected agencies for long term co-existence of human and sloth bears.

2. Please explain any unforeseen difficulties that arose during the project and how these were tackled (if relevant).

Gathering and arranging the meetings. The villagers are mainly labourers, so during village meetings we have to adjust time frame according to the availability of the locals. The process was lengthy, but we managed.

3. Briefly describe the three most important outcomes of your project.

- I. The intensity of conflict was identified, and conservation village clubs were formed in the high conflict prone villages to implement the mitigation plan which have been suggested.
- II. The problem and the conflict situation were raised in an international platform highlighting the status and profundity of the problematic sloth bear population.
- III. The capacity building of the locals and the forest staffs were done with special reference to the conservation of sloth bears and its habitat.

4. Briefly describe the involvement of local communities and how they have benefitted from the project (if relevant).

- With the formation of Bear Club, the young locals were very active in the conservation works.
- The villagers who were unaware of the compensation schemes, were informed and explained about the procedure.
- The meetings and workshops enlighten the importance of wildlife in human being life and also its need for balancing the ecosystem.
- The forest department was informed regarding the high and medium conflict villages so that the forest fringe areas can be monitored for reducing human bear interactions.
- The village heads (Sarpanch) were informed to put streetlights under government schemes.
- The forest department initiated the reforestation schemes with special reference to sloth bear conservation.

5. Are there any plans to continue this work?

Yes, we will continue this work involving more people in programmes on sloth bear conservation, monitoring and formation of new bear clubs. We will also measure the biotic pressure on the sloth bear habitats and quantify the food availability for the bears in the area.

6. How do you plan to share the results of your work with others?

- Articles on bear rescue activities were published in Local newspapers for local people awareness.
- The study results were published in a national level conference organised by Odisha State board of Biodiversity during 22nd May 2015.
- The research work was presented in SCCS-Bangalore an international conference on Conservation Science during 8-11 September 2015.
- A conflict conservation plan will be submitted to divisional forest officer for implementation of human-sloth bear conflict mitigation propagations
- We are also working on manuscript for publication of the outcomes of the research work in journals.

7. Timescale: Over what period was the RSG used? How does this compare to the anticipated or actual length of the project?

The Rufford small grant work was proposed for 12 months, started from July 2014 but the project work continued for 13 months (July 2014-August 2015).

We will further development our further work in quantify the population status of the sloth bears and its group structure, status of bear habitat, movement pattern, food habits and socio-economic status of local villagers in the Nilgiri wildlife range. We will further work more on awareness and education programmes on conflict mitigation activities for the locals of the conflict areas
