

Project Update: February 2015

SAHU's project team from July to September 2014 was mobilising the local community leaders and producing training materials in Swahili language. From October 2014 to January 2015, the project team was offering educational training on the dangerous effects of uranium to the environments, community health and workers in the area to local cell leaders, counsellors, village representatives and teachers. During this period, SAHU has been able to train 238 local leaders in the communities of Namtumbo, Mkongo, Magazini, Lusewa and Kitanda. The project team met the Minister for Natural Resources and Tourism on 16th August, 2014, Mr Lazaro Nyalandu to work on an effective strategy to fight against poaching in Selous Game Reserve and work out a plan that the uranium project is reversed or revised. Through this activism the Tanzanian government has decided to establish Tanzania Wildlife Management Authority (TAWA) to reshape the wildlife management and conservation.
