The people were informed about the upcoming project and its objectives. Their social and religious beliefs, and opinions on snakes, were incorporated during the meeting. Commencement of field survey

A field survey was conducted in upper region of the JDNP from July to August 2014 to assess the snake species diversity. Four different species of snakes belonging to two families were recorded along with their associated variables: *Ovophis monticola*, (Gunther, 1864) *Amphiesma platyceps* (Blyth, 1854) *Ptyas nigromiginata* (Blyth, 1854) and *Trachischium spp* (Blyth, 1854).
