During implementing the project with local government office (Sub-Department of Forestry in the province), they suggested to study bat's population in another location in the province (mangrove forest habitat), we did it and we found that bats' amount exist and live a lot.

3. Briefly describe the three most important outcomes of your project.

- Training workshops for around 200 people (from different groups, levels and location in the province)
- Signboards and reports which put in bats' living area in the bat pagoda and which transfers knowledge of bats to other people.
- The study of bat in mangrove forest are in the coastal area which work together among students, local government officers and local authority.

4. Briefly describe the involvement of local communities and how they have benefitted from the project (if relevant).

The local people participate into the project as joining the training workshop, livelihood improvement by vocational training for handmade product (related to bat) and signboards construction.

5. Are there any plans to continue this work?

We plan to continue for the third project:

- Action plans as training workshops, education training conservation for local students and young generation, bats' trafficking investigation and building capacity for local officers to the new bats' living area in mangrove forest (coastal area).
- For the bat's population in bat pagoda, we plan to create "site visiting" for visitors in order that travellers and local community cannot come to harry "bat's living"
- We try to work closely with local government in order to make new regulation about the bats in the province and try to work with other provinces in the region to protect bats.

6. How do you plan to share the results of your work with others?

We own many handmade (books) and final report which can use for souvenir and gift as well as present our report, we would like to share it to:

- Rufford Foundation by sending the report and some photos which relate to the project.
- Bat Conservation International by mailing and emailing
- Local government offices by sending report and some photos
- Local people and bat pagoda by sending some photos and report, we can use our products for fundraising.
- Schools in the provinces, the libraries and Can Tho University by donating some products and photos from the project.
