

## Project Update: June 2017

We highlighted our project with local NGOs, environmental police, students, and other interested parts. This event was held at Instituto Universitario de la Paz, the most important university in the direct influence area of the project.

We also created a Facebook fan page as an alternative way to promote our project and update some of our field activities (<https://www.facebook.com/RoadkillColombianwildmammals/>). Currently, we count with almost 200 followers (including NGOs, groups, colleagues, friends, and interested people), but we hope to attract more people as the project progresses. Our project and our association are now part of the Red Colombiana de Seguimiento de Fauna Atropellada (<http://www.recosfa.net/>). Thanks to this collaboration agreement, we have now access to a mobile app (<http://apps.espanol.es/iphone-ipad/navegacion/recofsa-dgwvngs.html>), which has been shared with interested people for report road kill events from any part of our country. In addition, we use the website of this network to show the results of our surveys in the map of road kill events for Colombia.

We finished our first six-months of road kill surveys (until May 2017). During this time, we recorded more than 300 road-killed animals, including wildlife mammals, reptiles, birds, and amphibians.
