Project Update: January 2017

Biodiversity Conservation through Organic Piggery Project is making it for the local people in the communities neighbouring Bwindi Impenetrable National Park and environment. People are taking pig dung as an important resource where the funds will come from after selling the vegetables. Poachers have reformed indeed, because of their total commitment to alternative livelihood activities. It is amazing when reformed poachers bring their fellows to reform. We have so far registered over 70 pure reformed poachers, and are all busy in piggery, and vegetable growing. The numbers of good breed of pigs in the community have considerably increased because of this initiative. With CIBIC farmers alone, we now have 200 mature pigs owned by six groups and 15 individuals. My team and conservation partners made this a success. Farmers have opened up a grocery, now looking forward to build a pork butcher.
