2. Please explain any unforeseen difficulties that arose during the project and how these were tackled.

Since the project sites were concentrated in four districts and required to complete within the stipulated seasons of grasshopper, there were little difficulties. Lack of expertise in identifying the species was also a barrier for this project.

However, continual field work with close coordination with the field staff from all districts has addressed the challenges enabling us to complete the task within the workplan. Even within the optimum capacity of entomologists from renowned research centres, there were little difficulties in identifying the species and through further intimation with experts; the issue has been tackled enabling to complete the project on time.

3. Briefly describe the three most important outcomes of your project.

- a) Generated baseline data for grasshopper diversity and abundances in two different ecosystems.
- b) Documented more diversity and abundances of grasshopper in cultivated ecosystem than natural forest ecosystem indicating that, grasshopper preferred in disturbed area calling for immediate conservation collaboration from local communities.
- c) Awareness of local communities in four districts within the premises of study area was focussed. Total of 1800 heads were participated on awareness programme and eight primary schools. Ecological roles of minute organisms in ecosystems were highlighted transforming the people perception into positive attitudes.

4. Briefly describe the involvement of local communities and how they have benefited from the project.

Local communities of study areas from four districts were directly engaged for awareness programme about the existence of grasshoppers as livelihood with ecological benefits.

Students of CNR and UWICER were engaged for field assistance in data collection on daily DSA payment system. About nine community members were hired for field activity in two study sites with daily allowances and service charges. During awareness campaign in village, catering was done from nine community members with payment basis, which has helped their socio economy in small little way.

5. Are there any plans to continue this work?

Yes, the project will continue in eastern part of the country to correlate the species diversity. The study has to be continued at least for 1 more year to cover wider areas and increase seasonal search efforts to generate baseline data for country. The funding is being explored for the same.

6. How do you plan to share the results of your work with others?

Awareness campaign with relevant stakeholders and targeted group of farmers, production of leaflets and pamphlets and scientific paper has been submitted to the Bhutan Journal of Natural Resources Development for wider publicity and to share the research outcomes. I am having close links with research centres in Bhutan and whenever, conference and seminar are underway, I will deliver presentation about the outcome of my project to share the results.

7. Timescale: Over what period was the grant used? How does this compare to the anticipated or actual length of the project?

Based on workplan in proposal and subsequent approval and release of fund from RSG, procurement the field equipment as estimated in the proposal and then sequentially executed my activities against the fund layout. The funds were judiciously utilised as per the estimated over the entire length of my project without any hindrances.

The fund of £5000 was utilised from July 2016 to July 2017 for conducting my project.
