During the project time, the COVID -19 outbreak hit the world. The area where we were conducting the proposed work was also highly affected. As a result, we have to modify our conservation awareness programme. Instead of in-person awareness activities, in addition to radio programs, we published different articles in collaboration with local media.

3. Briefly describe the three most important outcomes of your project.

• To date, no studies have attempted to determine and explore harvester and trader viewpoints on *Cordyceps* harvesting and its ecological impacts. We



explored both harvester and trader diverging viewpoints on Cordyceps harvesting and its ecological impacts.

- Local harvester and trader perceptions and attitudes towards different management practices and policies were identified.
- The trade flow of Cordyceps in Dolpa was assessed.

4. Briefly describe the involvement of local communities and how they have benefitted from the project.

The community members actively participated throughout the activities conducted through this project. Without the active involvement of local communities, it would not have been possible to achieve the stated goals of this project. Local communities are concerned about the ecological impacts of the unsustainable harvesting of *Cordyceps*. We shared results from this and previous projects with the local communities through radio programmes. We also published multiple articles and blog posts about different economic, ecological, and current social issues related to *Cordyceps* on local media. The preliminary results were shared with the local leaders. Once we finish our data analysis and have the recommendations, we plan to share those with the local leaders, which can be further included in the *Cordyceps* Management Plan prepared at the local level.

5. Are there any plans to continue this work?

I am planning to continue this work in the future. I intend to conduct a similar survey on other pastures in Nepal. Also, I like to carry out the study to the landscape level and try to understand the overall impacts of harvesting on the biodiversity at landscapes. The overall landscape-level understanding of ecological and economic impacts will be very important to prescribe the sustainable management of this species and conservation of the fragile high-altitude ecosystem.

Due to the COVID-19, local government-imposed ban in harvesting Cordyceps in 2020 and 2021. As I have collected data before COVID-19, I am interested in understanding the socio-economic impact of COVID-19 on the livelihood of the local community dependent on Cordyceps harvesting.

6. How do you plan to share the results of your work with others?

The results of this work are shared through different means of communication such as YouTube. We have plans of publishing results in scientific journals too. I am preparing three manuscripts for publications in peer-reviewed journals from the data collected from this project. Although one paper was accepted for presentation at the American Association of Geographer Annual Meeting 2021, I could not present it due to the COVID-19 travel restrictions. We used a local radio station to air the research outputs. We published articles in national newspapers and media outlets.
