

## Project Update: October 2021

We have monitored our camera traps over the past 4 months and have recorded some interesting results which I have shared the YouTube link with your outfit (<https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=CWFw7L-iFD8>).

Following these encouraging results, we have intensified our schools and community engagement activities to ensure compliance.

Over the period we have also rescued three live white bellied pangolins (two males and one female) and safely reintroduced the individuals back to the Asukese Forest Reserve. Our revisits to previously survey areas also revealed few encounters with snares, traps and empty cartridges compared to our first project.

The project team also met to discuss the progress of our activities. We have been engaged in schools' and community awareness raising programs and donated books (readers) and t-shirts to all 88 the Wildlife Club members.
