Project Update: November 2011

1) Community meetings

We organized community meetings for the awareness raising about the importance of nature resources of high mountain eco-region. Local community was sensitized about the emerging threats of habitat degradation in the area. These meetings were conducted at Arangkel, Kel, Dokran Domil and Shounthar villages in the project area. Community members were briefed about the projective objectives and importance of Community Organization for the Conservation Purpose and sustainable development. Some local activists were motivated to organize as local conservation forum and they join the local conservation organization *Breath Foundation*.

2) Establishment of nature 2 Nature clubs and Awareness sessions in schools

Awareness about the nature conservation for the school going children was the basic target of the project. Two, student nature clubs were established in the area and awareness session we delivered to the students.

3) Habitat surveys

The project area constitutes on High mountain Eco-Zone will become inaccessible during winter, so we organized two field surveys to access the population and habitat status of WFS. Data was collected about the presence and population status of WFS through direct field observation and questionnaires surveys from herders, hunters and Salajeet (A black inorganic substance leaching from overhanging cliffs, having much importance in local traditional medical

cure) collectors. The base line report was prepared and soon will share to the Azad Jammu Kashmir Pakistan Wildlife department for future conservation management and planning.
