### A CLOSER LOOK AT OUR NEW PRODUCERS:

SEPALI is thrilled to announce that among our 29 new breeders this year, we now have 11 successful producers. In addition to our veteran breeders Jaonary Jean, Ranfanoely, Bernard, and Marie Jeanne, we now welcome Rasoa (Ambodivoangy), Zafinirina Helene (Ambinanitelo), Marivelo (Ambodivoangy), Nafosonina Eloi (Ambinanitelo), Jacky Armand (Ambinanitelo), Bemihivitra Roger (Ambinanitelo), and Fenozara Justin (Ambodivoangy). Although our new producers are still learning, they are already making a vital impact on the SEPALI project through their cocoon contribution and inspiration to others.

Together, this new group has produced over 5800 cocoons. Equally as important, their success is contagious. The other newly trained breeders are eager to try for themselves. Impatient to begin rearing silkworms, one breeder even produced 40 cocoons using his tree nursery of seedlings no more than 20 cm tall.

### A UNIQUE APPROACH:



*Cooperative Techniques*

Recognizing the opportunity for cooperation within the SEPALI communities, our new producers in Ambodivoangy and Ambinanitelo have been problem-solving on their own. The group has developed a semi-cooperative system similar to the one used for rice production. Our farmers are now renting land, trees, and even moths to each other in order to maximize productivity.

If one farmer has many trees, but not enough time to rear larvae, he rents his land to another farmer who has plenty of time but not enough trees. Money is not usually exchanged in these arrangements, but the cocoon production is split between the two parties. In this way, our farmers have developed a system that is accessible to all community members.

### BIG STRIDES FOR SEPALI: Mamy goes to the United States

Mamy Ratsimbazafy, the director of SEPALI, was recently chosen by the US Embassy in Madagascar as the sole Malagasy representative for an NGO training conference in the USA. Next month, Mamy will travel to the US with representatives from other developing nations and attend a three week conference about NGO management techniques.

The conference, located in many major cities around the United States, will take place in late May. Mamy is looking forward to the opportunity and is hoping to meet with the representatives from CPALI American if possible.

Although some of the women had never used a sewing machine before, they were quick learners and were able to produce six square meters of fabric in only one week.

SEPALI will continue to invite women's groups from each community to participate in the workshops. The next community to host a workshop will be Ambodivoangy.

The recent success of our new producers made it possible to host a textile processing workshop with one of our women's groups this month. The 5 women from Ambinanitelo came to the SEPALI office in Maroantsetra for 5 days to be trained to process the cocoons and sew the textile. The women were trained by the capable hands of Mario and Lalaina.

## Continuing the SEED Initiative.
