Children's Workshops to promote knowledge and conservation of sharks and rays

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Introduction

Mar Sustentable Ciencia y Conservación has been working on marine communication and environmental education in the Mexican Caribbean since 2015.

As part of this work, the support of the Save Our Seas Foundation allowed us to start a collaboration with Fundación Mundo Azul to develop virtual workshops in Mexico for children interested in the conservation of sharks and marine biodiversity.

The Mundo Azul Foundation has been working since 2020 to develop virtual workshops for children focused on the conservation of sharks. These workshops have reached Guatemala and 13 other countries in Latin America and the Caribbean. The workshops have had a reach of 908 people. Through this collaboration with Mar Sustentable, we are interested in promoting knowledge and appreciation for sharks by new generations in the Mexican Caribbean.

We consider that the actions we are taking with the Mundo Azul Foundation are very favorable due to their experience in environmental education regarding developing virtual workshops for children.

The workshops in the Mexican Caribbean are part of research activities being carried out by Mar Sustentable in Isla Holbox, Cozumel, and Isla Mujeres, where the history of fishing and the change in diversity and availability of fishing resources are being studied. Our research in the region has been supported by The Rufford Foundation

Overtime. We believe that these workshops will help us disseminate knowledge about sharks in the Mexican Caribbean in the population of Quintana Roo. We are deeply grateful to the Save Our Seas Foundation and the Rufford Foundation for their support in this environmental education work in the Mexican Caribbean.

Participants

Three face-to-face sessions happened at the "Art Power" School of Art based in Cozumel, Quintana Roo. This is an art CENTER in Cozumel Island.

Free activities are held here to involve children to DEVELOP THEIR CREATIVITY. Its founder, Anita Yeh Norrie, aims to promote children's CREATIVITY in populations of children who have economic limitations to access art-related activities: .

September 6th: 13 participants
- September 13th: 12 participants
- September 20th: 13 participants

Different girls and boys attended each session. However, six children (3 girls and 3 boys) participated in the three consecutive sessions.

During the launch of the workshops on social networks, 21 children from different country states and some foreigners registered. Six virtual sessions happened through the Zoom platform.

In the first session, we had 15 participants; from the second session until the end, 12 children attended (9 boys and three girls). The age range of the participants was five to ten years.




Figure 4. Screenshot taken during the first session "Knowing sharks" with the students of the online workshop.

Workshop 1: Knowing sharks, August 23, 2021

Objective: Introduce children to the different species of sharks and rays that inhabit the Gulf of Mexico and the Mexican Caribbean. Some aspects of their biology were revealed, such as their eating habits, behavior, threats, and category within the Red List of Endangered Species.

Presentation Content: The presentation showed six species of sharks and two rays with ecological importance in the Yucatan Peninsula. This presentation was interactive as the children read some of the slides and commented on curious facts that they knew about some species.

Children's act : Make a crown-shaped like a shark's dorsal fin. The instructions were part of the presentation, and the teachers' team were aware of any doubts or comments on how to do the craft.

Workshop 2: The Hammerhead Shark. August 30, 2021.














Figure 8. Students of the online workshops with their Hammerhead shark's mask.

Objective: Show hammerhead shark monitoring on Isla del Coco, Costa Rica and mention the presence of hammerhead sharks in the Yucatan Peninsula.

Presentation Content: Underwater videos of the Hammerhead Shark habitat on Isla del Coco were given in this presentation. We simulated with the children that we were submerged in the water. Information was provided to explain why hammerhead sharks are "the doctors of the sea" serving as key species in determining the health of marine ecosystems.

Children's activity: Hammerhead shark mask. The Activity was carried out during the online session. The instructions were part of the presentation and the organizing team was aware of any doubts or comments on how to do the craft.

- * Large cardstock
- *Pair of scissors

Workshop 3: Looking for Sawfishes. September 06, 2021.

Objective: Understand the sawfishes' importance and the causes of its alarming category "in critical danger of extinction".

Presentation Content: As an introduction, we talked about coral reefs and mangroves, exposing the kids to the ecosystem services they provide. The children learned about the marine biodiversity in the Mesoamerican Barrier Reef System. A virtual search mission to find sawfishes through videos occurred during the class by watching drones videos of sawfishes from real monitoring.

Children's activity: Plasticine Sawfish. The instructions were part of the presentation, and the organizing team was on the lookout for questions or comments on how to do the craft.

- * Plasticine of the color you like
- * Wooden chopsticks
- *White glue

Workshop 4: Marine Pollution by Masks. September 13, 2021.

Objective: To inform a new type of ocean pollution derived from the COVID-19 pandemic: masks. Teach that disposable masks are part of the garbage that reaches the seas, seriously affecting marine ecosystems.

Presentation Content: This virtual presentation included data on the amounts of masks that have reached the ocean, characteristics such as that they are not biodegradable, and that they affect the trophic chains of the seas.

Children's activity: Create a shark mask. The instructions were part of the presentation and the organizing team was on the lookout for questions or comments on how to do the craft.

- * White cloth mouth mask
- *Brushes
- * Black down
- * Water-based paint pink, black and white colors

Workshop 5: Guests from Latinamerica which are part of the Club de los tiburones. September 20, 2021.

Objective: Present to the children of the Club de los tiburones Mexico, outreach projects promoted by students of the Club de Los Tiburones from other countries and motivate the children of the Club in Mexico to be disseminators for the conservation of chondrichthyans.

Presentation Content: There was the participation of 5 students of the Shark Club, where each one briefly explained what their project was about and how it contributed to the conservation of sharks.

Workshop 6: Final session. Outreach exercise for children. September 27, 2021.
















Figure 12. Drawings from the last session which the students from the online workshops used for their excersie.


